## Petal Pusher Editor Needed

This will be the last issue of the newsletter printed under the editorship of Betty Walters, who has completed her committed four years to the Society.

Submissions for the next issue need to be made by February 1 to President Rex Hill at <rexhill@earthlink.net>, or mailed to him at his address (see back page).

The editor's position fulfills a great need for the Society.

Items for every bimonthly issue include calendar of events, chapter news, welcome to new members, list of Board, committee chairs, and chapter representatives (back page), how and where to submit articles to the newsletter (listed in calendar), membership application, graphics or photos.

Items that should be included when they come out are highlights of Board meetings, publications of interest, formation of new chapters, and the book list (Hawthorn Chapter).

The Board has voted to publish the following as described below.

1. Bylaws: Every five years (2010, 2015, 2020, etc.), or whenever there are changes, or if they are revised.

2. Membership List: To be published in even numbered year within first six months. (Insure that published list does not contain names that have requested to not be listed.)

NOTE: The above is only a list of required items. The editor has much leeway in writing articles, or adding articles contributed from the membership, such as botanical articles, field trip summaries, recipes, book reviews, jokes and cartoons, committee reports, graphics, art, and poetry.

The editor may also want to try to get a regular column from the President, or from certain committees.

Additionally, the editor needs to solicit articles and remind Board Members to submit newsworthy items, and those pertinent to the business of the Society, for each of the six issues produced on an annual basis.

The publication is formatted and produced with PageMaker 7.0 software, and the Society owns its own copy of this Adobe software for Windows, which will be given to the new editor. For system requirements, please visit [[www.adobe.com/products/pagemaker/systemreqs.html](http://www.adobe.com/products/pagemaker/systemreqs.html)].

Experience with PageMaker is preferred, but knowledge of Adobe software and a strong desire to master PageMaker will be considered.

Other members of the board, Bill Knight and Ann Earley handle distribution and mailing lists.

The editor produces each copy, converts it to an Adobe Acrobat format and e-mails it to the publisher; therefore, does not necessarily need to reside in the St. Louis area.

## Petal Pusher via E-mail?

This is a request to our members who might like to receive the *Petal Pusher* electronically in the near future. This could speed the delivery and possibly save some of our mailing costs.

The publication would come to you as an attachment with a 'pdf' extension which can be read by Adobe Acrobat Reader which most people have on their machines. It is a freeware reader that can easily be downloaded.

There are, however, several considerations.

Some of you may have issues, either at work, or at home with allowing 'pdf' documents to reach you via e-mail. They can be filtered by your internet provider.

The attachment would typically be 500 Kilobytes(Kb) or less, but that can take a minute or two to receive over a phone line connection. The maximum size for last year's six issues was 370 Kb with an average of 320 Kb per issue.

The Board needs to hear from you (as many as wish to respond) about your interest. You can do that by e-mailing Ann Earley, our membership chairperson, at <aee623@prodigy.net>.

Put **Petal Pusher** in the subject line and please put your name in the body of the message as well as your thoughts about receiving the *Petal Pusher* via e-mail. This will give us your current (and accurate) e-mail address for our records and link that address to your name in our files.

# Hawthorn Chapter Report

We held our annual wreath making workshop early this year in order to have wreaths to sell at the Chestnut Festival at the UM Horticulture and Agroforestry Research Center. The workshop was held at long-time member Laura Ellifrits' farm in October. Many wonderful wreaths were created from native plant materials, some of which were gathered on-site. Following the wreath making, we adjourned to the cool-flowing Cedar Creek for a cookout. Laura and her husband have spent quite a bit of energy and money to restore a wetland on their property.

The weather was absolutely superb for the annual Chestnut Festival - warm, blue skies, and no wind. In years past we have sustained wind damage to our canopy, which protects our books, plants, and wreaths from the weather. We sold lots of good books, about half the wreaths, and some plants. Nadia Navarrete led the wildflower/plant walks for festival attendees.

Later in October a small, dedicated group of our members turned out for the annual fall foliage hike to Painted Rock State Forest. We took an off-trail hike to investigate some of the areas recently cleared and thinned of timber in an effort to restore the glades. There were a lot of late blooming asters, goldenrods, quite a few rudbeckias, and an area that had many scattered Ladies Tresses orchids. It's amazing what regrows when it is given the opportunity. After the hike we had a fabulous lunch at the Native Stone Winery, north of Jefferson City.

Our regular chapter meeting in November was well attended by folks who came to learn the "Basics of Plant Identification" with Dr. Jean Everett of the College of Charleston. Jean is a familiar face to many of us as she participates in our hikes whenever she is in town visiting her parents, Nancy and George Brakhage. Along with many outstanding plant photos, Jean discussed the diagnostic vegetative and reproductive characteristics of the nine largest plant families. She emphasized learning the art of observation to distinguish the various characteristics. After her talk many of us were ready to sign up for a week-long workshop with her. ## St. Louis Chapter Report

Our October meeting was held on the 25<sup>th</sup> and it was our customary annual 'bring your slides to show' day. We enjoyed seeing plants (and some creatures) up close and personal. Even one of our newer members, Retha Edens, gave a slide show of her trip to some Ozark glades and we enjoyed seeing the vistas through Retha's lens.

November 11<sup>th</sup> brought out some of our members, along with several birders and Forest Park community groups, to Forest Park in St. Louis to cut down several acres of invasive *Lonicera maackii* (aka Amur bush honeysuckle). Steve Buback, who is a St. Louis chapter member and staff at Forest Park, organized this outing. It turns out that the park will receive matching federal funds for each man hour worked by the volunteers. He tells us that money will be used to continue work eradicating the honeysuckle. I want to mention that the staff from Forest Park also volunteered *their* time for this worthwhile cause.

On September 30, 2006 the St. Louis chapter of the Missouri Native Plant Society joined the continuing education Wetland Plant Identification class from St. Louis Community College (led by Nels Holmberg) to visit an area in northeastern St. Charles County. During the field trip, a large thick patch of an unrecognizable plant was spotted across a linear pond along the trail. The experienced botanists in the group were consulted, but none could recognize the plant. Using binoculars borrowed from the butterfly-spotting enthusiasts in the group, the plants could be identified only as a *Polygonum*, species unknown to the group.

# Quarterly Board Meeting Highlights, Lamar, Missouri

President Rex Hill (RH) called the meeting to order. Quorum assessment was okay. Agenda approved.

Quarterly board meeting minutes approved.

Treasurer's Report (on file with Secretary)—Bob Siemer: The fiscal year began July 1. Total for current accounts (Share Savings, Money Market, Checking) equals \$8,337.07. CDs 3,4,5,9 total \$5,503.48. Total operating funds equal \$1,3840.55. Hudson Fund CD's 8 and 10 total \$14,044.96. The Budget is similar to last year's.

### PUBLICATIONS AND MEDIA

Publicity Chairman Report—Kevin Bley: Looking for organizations (e.g. school, churches, etc.) to recognize for use of native plants.

*Petal Pusher*—Betty Walters (BW): Betty thanked everyone who has contributed to the *Petal Pusher*. RH asked JO to put a note in the *Petal Pusher* with hints for formatting and sending images. An issue was raised regarding the tardiness of mail delivery of the *Petal Pusher* (e.g. Robin, Tim, etc.), no real explanation available. BW noted that the newsletter could be sent to members by e-mail (PDF). RH would like to try and avoid going to a higher class of mail (postage cost). Pat Harris noted the WGNSS (Webster Groves Nature Study Society) practice of giving members the option to pay higher dues for 1<sup>st</sup> class delivery of the newsletter. Bill Knight will check into the added cost of sending the newsletter 1<sup>st</sup> class.

*Missouriensis*—George Yatskievych (GY): GY stated that material is gathering, but there is not yet enough for a full issue.

Hudson Fund Committee—GY: Will have something to report in December.

MONPS Website: Fact Sheet #5 Invasives Fact Sheet, GY may have originals of some invasive plant drawings, Tim Smith said it would be okay to use these in the fact sheet. A 2<sup>nd</sup> draft, incorporating comments, will be provided at later date.

### COMMITTEES & TASK FORCES

Membership stats—Ann Earley: 22 new members since June 17; 346 members total, with two additional life members for a total of 38. A list has been sent to chapter reps of non-renewing members.

Awards Committee—Jack Harris (JH): JH put an updated Nels bio in the *Petal Pusher*. Should the award that went to Alberici be included with the current awards, i.e., Stewardship, Service, Education, Research, Steyermark? Sherry Leis **Moved** that Kevin Bley draft a set of guidelines for appreciation—for the Board to approve. Bob Siemer **Seconded** the motion. Motion passed.

Chapter Reports: Hawthorn, Kansas City, and Saint Louis reports on file with Secretary.

### SOCIETY BUSINESS

Fund Raiser: GY suggested that MONPS might produce something besides T-shirts, e.g. ball caps, to sell for fund raising. Chapters should talk it over.

Donation to Tom Aley's Ozark Underground Laboratory: A check for \$400.00 dollars was delivered to Tom Aley and was much appreciated. Paul McKenzie reported that seed has been purchased, and they are ready to go forward with prairie restoration work.

John Oliver, write a short article for *Petal Pusher* suggesting file sizes and methods of submitting photos for publication.

Bill Knight, write short article for *Petal Pusher* announcing the start of 1<sup>st</sup> class mail delivery for those willing to pay for it.

Kevin Bley, put together a short summary of criteria for a MONPS "Certificate of Appreciation" recognizing and publicizing specific actions of individuals or groups which benefit native plants.

Sherry Leis, confer with Marlene Miller and others in the Osage Plains chapter to produce a tribute to Dr. Carol Eaglesfield to be published in the *Petal Pusher* or *Missouriensis*.

Chapter Reps—urge lapsed members of your chapters to renew their memberships.
